





ABN Referrals by Ethnicity




ABN Referrals by Gender












Permanency Outcomes




Ethnicity of Greene County Children



Gender of Greene County Children




Ages of Greene County Children

Road To Reunification (R2R)

- Road to Reunification was developed in Greene County and is a class put on by Abuse/Neglect Juvenile Officers which explains the court process, team meeting process, roles and responsibilities of team members, treatment plans and parent-child visitation and interactions to parents with children who have been placed into foster care.
 - 103 Parents completed the R2R class in 2011.
- 2011 Permanency decision results
 - 53% of the cases had a Reunification case goal finding.
 - 35% of the cases had an Adoption case goal finding.

Road To Reunification (R2R)

- Each parent completing the R2R class is asked to describe what they found most helpful about the class. Here are a few of their comments.
 - "The reunification process was something I did not fully understand and they made it clear."
 - "I will improve on the visitation and interaction with my children."
 - "To do what is expected of me as a parent and the safety of my children.
 - About different way's I can succeed and interact with my child better and what is available to me.

Kids In Court (KIC)

- Kids In Court was developed in Greene County to give older youth (age 12 and older) an active voice in the court process and decisions that affect their life and their future.
- In 2011 666 hearings were held for older youth that involved 351 older youth.
 - In 2011 older youth were able to attend their hearings 37% of the time.

Kids In Court (KIC)

- When older youth attend hearings they are asked to complete a brief survey to get their input about the importance of attending court hearings. Here are a few of their comments.
 - "I want to know what the Judge says, not what others tell me he said."
 - "Because it inspires me and motivates me to keep doing well in my treatment."
 - "So if I have any questions I can ask the Judge and I can understand and know what is going on."
 - "I like to be the person to let the Judge know how I am doing."
