
Discussion:

Storms will continue along and north of Hwy 60 this morning. Scattered storms will remain possible into this afternoon, mainly N of I-44. The tornado risk is decreasing across the area this morning; however, an isolated brief tornado may still be possible with any storms tracking along the front. Cloud to ground lightning is also possible. Flooding and flash flooding will remain possible this morning as storms continue to develop and move over already saturated areas.

Citizen Action Statement:

- Have a severe weather shelter plan! Review emergency kit and identify closest safe shelter.
- Have a way of receiving severe weather warnings (NOAA Weather Radio, social media, news media, etc.)
- Take shelter when lightning is in the area! "When thunder roars...go indoors!"
- Citizens with outdoor recreational plans along area rivers and streams should be alert for the potential for lightning strikes and rapidly rising water levels. "Turn around...don't drown!"
