Watches/Warnings: *Flash Flood Watch* in effect until Friday morning.

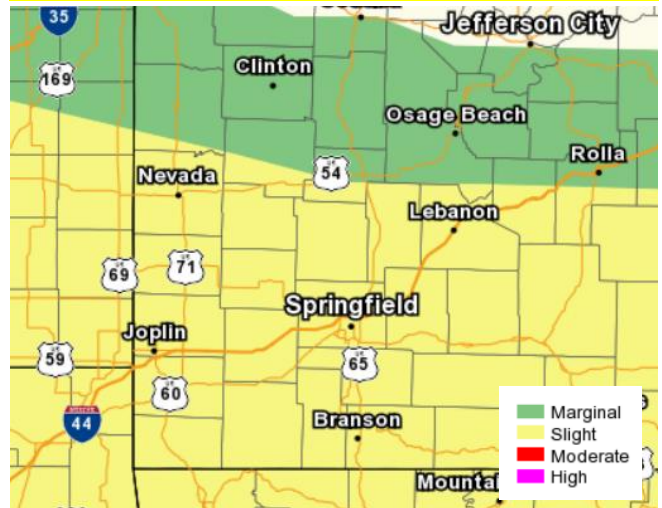

Discussion:
Scattered to numerous showers and storms will occur at times today and especially tonight. Severe weather is not expected at this time. However, a few storms could briefly produce winds up to 50 mph and cloud to ground lighting is possible. Additionally, heavy rainfall and flash flooding with 1-3 inches are possible today and tonight, especially S of I-44. A *Flash Flood Watch* is in effect until Friday morning. **Confidence Level: MODERATE** in flooding potential.

- Citizen Action Statement:**
- Have a severe weather shelter plan! Review emergency kit and identify closest safe shelter.
 - Have a way of receiving severe weather warnings (NOAA Weather Radio, social media, news media, etc.)
 - Take shelter when lightning is in the area! *“When thunder roars...go indoors!”*
 - Citizens with outdoor recreational plans along area rivers and streams should be alert for the potential for lightning strikes and rapidly rising water levels. *“Turn around...don’t drown!”*

- Emergency Management Issues:**
- The Region D WebEOC Incident **“2019-05-20 Regional Severe Weather and Flooding”** will remain open through at least next Mon., June 10 due to the continuing severe weather and flooding threats this week.
 - OEM is monitoring "WxNet" (B-15) on Greene County 800 TRS
 - Springfield-Greene County EOC is currently at **OpCon Level 3: Monitoring**
