Discussion:

Scattered thunderstorms are likely through the early morning hours with cloud to ground lightning possible. Stronger storms are capable of producing 1-inch hail and 60 mph wind. Scattered thunderstorms are expected to redevelop later this evening into the overnight hours with 1-inch hail and 60 mph winds possible. A scenario is setting up from late this weekend into Thurs. for periods of heavy rainfall. Total area rainfall amounts tonight through Sun. could range from 1 to 4 inches. The heaviest rainfall is expected to occur Sun. morning and continue into the afternoon. While confidence is increasing that the event will occur, confidence in the location of the heaviest rainfall and specific amounts remain low. This system should be monitored closely over the weekend.

Citizen Action Statement:

- Have a severe weather shelter plan! Review emergency kit and identify closest safe shelter.
- Have a way of receiving severe weather warnings (NOAA Weather Radio, social media, news media, etc.)
- Take shelter when lightning is in the area! "When thunder roars...go indoors!"
- Citizens with outdoor recreational plans along area rivers and streams should be alert for the potential for lightning strikes and rapidly rising water levels. "Turn around...don't drown!"

- Springfield-Greene County EOC is currently at OpCon Level 3: Monitoring
