Showers and storms will develop later this evening into the overnight hours with the potential for hail to 1 inch and damaging winds over 60 mph. Frequent cloud to ground lightning will also be possible. Heavy rainfall rates from these storms could produce flash flooding, especially for locations that see repeated rounds of storms. The highest potential for severe weather and flooding tonight is along and N of I-44. Additional shower and storm chances will occur on almost a daily basis across the area with potential for severe weather and flooding depending on location of storms. However, many locations will see several rounds of rainfall over the next week.

### **Citizen Action Statement:**

- Have a severe weather shelter plan! Review emergency kit and identify closest safe shelter.
- Have a way of receiving severe weather warnings (NOAA Weather Radio, social media, news media, etc.)
- Take shelter when lightning is in the area! "When thunder roars...go indoors!"
- Citizens with outdoor recreational plans along area rivers and streams should be alert for the potential for lightning strikes and rapidly rising water levels. "Turn around...don't drown!"

- OEM is monitoring "WxNet" (B-15) on Greene County 800 TRS
- Springfield-Greene County EOC is currently at OpCon Level 3: Monitoring
