Discussion:

Showers and thunderstorms will continue over portions of the area this morning. The primary risk with these storms is flash flooding.

Another round of thunderstorms will move in from the west late this morning into the afternoon hours. Large hail to the size of quarters, damaging winds to 60 mph, and flash flooding are possible with this round of storms.

Yet another round of storms is possible this evening into tonight. There is a conditional risk of severe storms with this round if enough instability can develop. If instability does develop, half dollar size hail, 60 mph damaging winds, flash flooding, and perhaps an isolated tornado would be possible.



- Have a severe weather shelter plan! Review emergency kit and identify closest safe shelter.
- Have a way of receiving severe weather warnings (NOAA Weather Radio, social media, news media, etc.)
- Take shelter when lightning is in the area! "When thunder roars...go indoors!"
- Citizens with outdoor recreational plans along area rivers and streams should be alert for the potential for lightning strikes and rapidly rising water levels. *"Turn around...don't drown!"*
