
Discussion:

Isolated to scattered storms are expected this afternoon into tonight with the greatest coverage from this afternoon through early evening. A few storms may become strong to severe mainly along and north of I-44. Cloud to ground lightning and wind gusts to 60 mph are possible. Locally heavy rainfall may produce isolated flash flooding with storms capable of hourly rainfall rates in excess of 1 inch per hour.

Citizen Action Statement:

- Have a severe weather shelter plan! Review emergency kit and identify closest safe shelter.
- Have a way of receiving severe weather warnings (NOAA Weather Radio, social media, news media, etc.)
- Take shelter when lightning is in the area! "When thunder roars...go indoors!"
- Citizens with outdoor recreational plans along area rivers and streams should be alert for the
 potential for lightning strikes and rapidly rising water levels. "Turn around...don't drown!"
