In today's Huddle, Mike Cromrey from the Watershed of the Ozarks discussed with us what all they do for Greene County.

## Watershed Committee of the Ozarks:

- Started in 1984.
- In early 1980's we had very serious water issues. Water at Wilson Creek was black; and the water at Fellows Lake was green.
- County, City Utilities and City of Springfield all came together to discuss how to fix this.
- They have one board meeting per month and a public meeting the 1<sup>st</sup> Monday of the month starting at 7:30 AM and ending at 8:30 AM, at the Midtown Library.

Tyler from Environmental said that a group from their office goes every month and anyone who wants to attend is welcome.

# **Education & Outreach**

- Mike said the heart of the Watershed is located at Valley Water Mill.
- They have a program which helps them work with schools to educate students on water quality.
- The College and Career Pathway Program with Hillcrest High School is helping teach Hillcrest students both how to grow native plants and the impact those plants have on the environment.
- Mike advised in another three (3) years this program should be funding its self.

### MS4 Compliance:

- Volunteer program MS4 Public Engagement.
- Partnership with Wilson Creek.
- Watershed Conservation Corps, provides engaging hands-on involvement by employing youth in watershed improvements.
- Mike talked about how a flood plan violation turned into a successful partnership on the Little Sac River restoration.

### USDA "RCPP":

• One of the biggest grants they have applied for and should know in about a week if funds will be granted.

What the Watershed Does: Educate on the importance of taking care of our water supply.
