Discussion:

Gusty west to northwesterly winds of up to 40 mph will continue this evening into Saturday morning. Strong to severe storms are expected to develop this afternoon and evening across locations east of Highway 65 and especially east of Highway 63. A few thunderstorms may develop ahead of the cold front this afternoon. Any storms that develop will have the potential to be severe with large hail, damaging winds, and a chance for tornadoes. Spotter activation may be needed this afternoon and evening for locations east of Highway 65.

Elevated fire weather conditions will occur Saturday through Monday, especially on Sunday, as low humidity combines with gusty winds. Gusty winds will develop again during the middle of next week.

Citizen Action Statement:

- Have a severe weather shelter plan! Review emergency kit and identify closest safe shelter.
- Have a way of receiving severe weather warnings (NOAA Weather Radio, social media, news media, etc.)
- Take shelter when lightning is in the area!
 - "When thunder roars...go indoors!"
- Citizens with outdoor recreational plans along area rivers and streams should be alert for the potential for lightning strikes and rapidly rising water levels.
 - "Turn around...don't drown!"
