Discussion:

Showers/thunderstorms will expand over the Missouri Ozarks today and tonight. A couple of storms could become organized with a limited risk for hail up to the size of quarters and wind gusts up to 60 mph.

Rainfall rates are likely to increase this evening into tonight, bringing a flash flood risk to the region. Any locations that receive training or repeated

thunderstorms could receive significant flash flooding. Numerous county roads and state highways could become flooded through late tonight

Widespread flooding of roads and low lying areas could be ongoing heading into Thursday morning.

By mid-day Thursday, the risk for severe thunderstorms will increase as a cold front approaches from the west. All modes of severe weather will be possible, including tornadoes, large hail, and damaging wind gusts.

Citizen Action Statement:

- Have a severe weather shelter plan! Review emergency kit and identify closest safe shelter.
- Have a way of receiving severe weather warnings (NOAA Weather Radio, social media, news media, etc.)
- Take shelter when lightning is in the area! "When thunder roars...go indoors!" Citizens with outdoor recreational plans along area rivers and streams should be alert for the potential for lightning strikes and rapidly rising water levels. "Turn around...don't drown!"
